# The Father's Role

*Ministry of Healing, p 391*

The husband and father is the head of the household. The wife looks to him for love and sympathy, and for aid in the training of the children; and this is right. The children are his as well as hers, and he is equally interested in their welfare. The children look to their father for support and guidance; he needs to have a right conception of life and of the influences and associations that should surround his family; above all, he should be controlled by the love and fear of God and by the teaching of His word, that he may guide the feet of his children in the right way. The father is the lawmaker of the household; and, like Abraham, he should make the law of God the rule of his home. God said of Abraham, "I know him, that he will command his children and his household." Genesis 18:19. There would be no sinful neglect to restrain evil, no weak, unwise, indulgent favoritism; no yielding of his conviction of duty to the claims of mistaken affection. Abraham would not only give right instruction, but he would maintain the authority of just and righteous laws. God has given rules for our guidance. Children should not be left to wander away from the safe path marked out in God's word, into ways leading to danger, which are open on every side.

Kindly, but firmly, with persevering, prayerful effort, their wrong desires should be restrained, their inclinations denied.

The father should enforce in his family the sterner virtues --energy, integrity, honesty, patience, courage, diligence, and practical usefulness. And what he requires of his children he himself should practice, illustrating these virtues in his own manly bearing.

But, fathers, do not discourage your children. Combine affection with authority, kindness and sympathy with firm restraint. Give some of your leisure hours to your children; become acquainted with them; associate with them in their work and in their sports, and win their confidence. Cultivate friendship with them, especially with your sons. In this way you will be a strong influence for good. The father should do his part toward making home happy. Whatever his cares and business perplexities, they should not be permitted to overshadow his family; he should enter his home with smiles and pleasant words.

In a sense the father is the priest of the household, laying upon the family altar the morning and evening sacrifice. But the wife and children should unite in prayer and join in the song of praise. In the morning before he leaves home for his daily labor, let the father gather his children about him and, bowing before God, commit them to the care of the Father in heaven. When the cares of the day are past, let the family unite in offering grateful prayer and raising the song of praise, in acknowledgment of divine care during the day.

*How can it be different? Is there some secret we are missing out on?*

*Yes, I believe there is, but I fear the answer may sound too simple to some of you or that it will not sound as radical or magical as you might have hoped. In writing this, I am not claiming to have reached the goal or that I no longer have occasion to bow with shame before the Lord. But there are simple, sure steps that I believe the Lord has put in place that I want to share with you.*

These are:

- Bible study
- Prayer
- Faith/Love
- Surrender

## the seed

There is a tantalizing verse in the first epistle of John that sounds puzzling at first glance:

“Whosoever is born of God doth not commit sin; for his seed remaineth in him: and he cannot sin, because he is born of God.”  
(1 John 3:9)

What can this verse mean by the mystical “seed” whereby we are “born of God” and are freed from sin?

If you were reading through the Bible in consecutive order you would have known what John was referring to, because just a few books previous, Peter tells us more about this seed.

“Being born again, not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, by the word of God, which liveth and abideth for ever.” (1 Peter 1:23)

### Alive

The word of God is the seed. Every seed has in itself a germinating principle. It contains the life of the plant. Just so there is life in God's word. Christ says, "The words that I speak unto you, they are Spirit, and they are life." John 6:63. "He that heareth My word, and believeth on Him that sent Me, hath everlasting life." John 5:24.

Those of you who have read the previous issues of The Narrow Way will remember how we discussed receiving the mind or Spirit of Christ through the word

in the first issue. Also how I urged you to make daily Bible reading one of your new year's resolutions in our last issue. So why bring it up again?

Because I am convicted that this aspect of Christian growth is so simple, it is easy to take it for granted or undervalue it. And yet it is so vital and plays so much larger a role in our transformation than we often realize.

Since the fateful day at seventeen when I finally gave my rebel heart to the Lord for keeps, I have often slipped in and out of good routine and consequently good devotional habits. I have memories of myself as a teen in my parent's house lying in bed awake, silently asking God, “How can I get out of this rut and serve you fully?” “spend more time with Me” was always the answer.

When musing more recently about the means of obtaining a truly victorious experience, I picked up a small devotional book nearby and read a chapter at random.

God spoke to me through the pages of that book, and once again I was impressed that God's word plays a vital role in our transformation.

Desire the sincere milk  
of THE WORD



that ye may grow thereby.

1 Peter 2:2

## **Immortal**

Please realize that God's word is not simply ink on paper or the sounds of language. It is "spirit and life." It is spoken of in 1 Pet 1:23 quoted above as being incorruptible, in other words immortal, alive with a life that cannot die, that liveth and abideth forever. Every command and every promise of the word of God is the very life and power of God, by which the command may be fulfilled and the promise realized.

There is a statement in a book I read that has awed me, and I believe it is true.

"He who by faith receives the word is receiving the very life and character of God."

## **Divine philosophy**

We go to school, college or university to develop our minds by studying the philosophies of man's conjectures. Let us learn the philosophy of Him who is truth. Let our brain power be exercised in studying the thoughts of God! If we study the word prayerfully with an honest desire for truth we are brought in actual contact with the mind of God. # THE DEVIL - GOD'S POLICEMAN?

Should people be forced to keep God's law?

*In response to recent court rulings against the public display of the Ten Commandments and the continual assault of a secular humanist agenda against traditional values, the Ten Commandments Commission has been created to restore and maintain the moral principles of the Judeo-Christian tradition in our nation and society.* - quoted from [www.tencommandmentsday.com](http://www.tencommandmentsday.com)

Do we suppose that the display of the Ten Commandments in public places will help stem the tide of crime in society? It will have far less effect than the ten commandments written on stone had in the days of Israel. They exclaimed, "all that the Lord hath said, will we do" (Ex 24:7) It was only 40 days later they were worshipping a golden calf! God wants the law written in our hearts, not on tables of stone. He exclaimed "O that there were such an heart in them, that they would fear me, and keep all my commandments always, that it might be well with them, and with their children for ever!" (De 5:29) and "And thou shalt love the LORD thy God with all thine heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy might." (De 6:5) It is heart worship God desires.

Of all people, we definitely believe in keeping the Ten Commandments, but God will only accept voluntary worship, and it seems to me, that in reality, the purpose of this commission, and the Ten Commandments Day, is for religious people to show a united front to influence politicians and judges. Jesus said "my kingdom is not of this world". He made no effort to force any one to believe. When the disciples wanted to call down fire from heaven He said "ye know not what spirit ye are of". He never tried to court the favor of, or to coerce kings, princes or even church leaders to better enforce His principles. The only compelling power Christ used was the power of unselfish love. That is the only power His followers should use.

God could have destroyed Satan and his sympathizers as easily as one can cast a pebble to the earth; but He did not do this. Rebellion was not to be overcome by force. Compelling power is found only under Satan's government. The Lord's principles are not of this order His authority rests upon goodness, mercy, and love; and the presentation of these principles is the means to be used. God's government is moral, and truth and love are to be the prevailing power {DA 759.1}

So what about the issue of displaying the Ten commandments in public places? "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof..." Therefore, Government is to stay out of those issues. Let the local agencies in charge decide how they want to decorate their building. We do not support the interpreting of the principle of separation of church and state to mean that local agencies can, or can't display religious art. They are to have nothing to do with deciding such issues.

The Ten Commandments I have usually seen in public places omit from the fourth commandment, the particular day of the week that God stated He wanted kept. And they also omit why He wanted it kept. For in six days the Lord made heaven and earth... and rested the seventh day". Does any one suppose that God was tired? Of course not. God set it up as a memorial day of His creative power! That is why He rested. And does any one have authority to change the memorial of your birthday, or independence day, or the Queens birthday? Suppose I were to keep the US independence day, instead of July 4, on a day set aside by some terrorist group in honor of one of their leaders? Then does any man have a right to change the memorial God set



up for Himself? We have no more power to do that than we can omit one day of the week. But if we display the Ten Commandments in our schools, which Sabbath will we teach? The Seventh Day as it says in the Bible, the Muslim Friday, the Catholic substituted day - Sunday, or the Greek Monday?

But even if the true Bible Sabbath were to be taught, we would have to oppose any efforts to gain the support of the state, for any religious purpose. Jesus clearly stated the separation that ought to exist between church and state when He said, render to Caesar the things that are Caesars, and to God the things that are God's.

James Madison said: "In the event of a statute for the support of the Christian religion, are the courts of law to decide what is Christianity? And as a consequence, to decide what is orthodoxy and what is heresy? The enforced support of the Christian religion dishonors Christianity." (Circulated in 1785 in remonstrance of a bill establishing a provision for teachers of the Christian religion. James Bancroft's "History of the Constitution," Vol. 1")

Wouldn't that be a horrible thing to return to those dark days when the civil power was controlled by the state, and the priest controlled how you thought, and you could be tortured and killed for what someone thought you thought.

Shall we not remember the dark ages stained with the blood of over a hundred million innocents, tortured and killed for Jesus, because they dared to follow their convictions? ✍

For those of you who were at our homeschool meetings, you will remember how David loved to tell us about his children! He told us (almost) proudly about how his 12 year old daughter had decided to use her birthday money to sponsor an orphan in Africa.

More recently, the little orphanage where Elyssa's orphan lives and goes to school sent the message, "Dear Vicki and other board members, please remove the names of the following children from the waiting list because they are all dead. They have died of starvation."

Poor Elyssa was heartbroken and she sent out emails and visited neighbors to raise money for these children. In our visit to America, I have now met the lady through whom Elyssa sponsors. Esther loves the children. She told me of their two orphanages, Hope Centre and Glory Centre, where 264 orphans are fed, clothed, schooled and loved. Unlike a number of other orphanages that provide

they are able to help more needy children. And they are reaching out

The care that is provided is not as "fancy" but

to many more than simply the orphans that live at the centre.

At the time of famine when the sad message of the deaths came through, Pastor Maurice from Glory Centre also wrote, "Some of our children have decided to forfeit their lunch meal and for the last two days we have been inviting about eighty seven children to come for lunch."

Not all orphanages in Africa are good, I have discovered. The most recent news I heard was that another orphanage was closed down by the government because the administrators had been keeping the funds for themselves and the children had gone without food for weeks. What to do with the orphans it housed? The government distributed the children to several other orphanages in the area. Now there are even more children that need care at Glory Center. These children need sponsors. If you would like to join Elyssa in helping the orphans, you can contact my new friend Esther McDaniel for more information.

Here's a little description she wrote for us of the work in Africa.

*We at Hearth to Hearth Ministries have been working with east African orphans since the latter quarter of 2001. Our experience has been interesting and rewarding. We began with one small orphanage in Kenya, housed in rented facilities. That orphanage now has it's own facility that has grown to care for 217 orphans. These children not only have a place to sleep and clothes on their backs but they feel part of a family and know they are loved and cherished.*

*At the beginning of 2005 we expanded to include another orphanage in Kenya, currently with 47 orphans. Our goal is to*

*build an orphanage for them also, getting them out of the rented facility they now occupy and making room to take in many more children off the streets.*

*The beginning of 2005 expansion also*



*included a work for widows and orphans in two different areas of Uganda, one of which includes another "budding orphanage" of 25 orphans.*

*Our ministry is operated totally by volunteers here in USA as well as in Africa though our African helpers do get small stipends when money is available. This means that nearly every penny of your donation goes directly to help a needy child or widow who is caring for orphans.*

*Our dedicated Administrators also do a great work in distributing food and water to the starving during times of famine. This is the third year we have been involved in food distribution and we are expanding to help the starving in Uganda as well as in Kenya.*

*God has truly blessed this venture beyond our wildest dreams. It is very gratifying to be a part of such a tremendous miracle.*

# to trust Him

...and trusting is believing...

It had been a discouraging several months. Nothing seemed to be going right. In my prayers I began asking God to show me why. I knew there had to be a good reason for all of this, but I couldn't see how it could help me, or anybody else. I just asked God to show me why. But the weeks passed into months and I still didn't have my answer, and it seemed that things were getting worse instead of better. Doubts began to come. I knew that God so loved the world... but what about me? Had he forgotten me. Did He know me personally and love me as an individual, or was it more like just a sympathy God has when He happens to notice someone in need, like I might have for a wounded animal? Did he love me personally enough to investigate how things were going with me, and commune with me and answer my prayers? It seemed my prayers got no higher than the ceiling.

Then one day, I was brought into contact with some that had had faith in God at one time, but had pretty much lost their faith and were not practicing any religious devotion. I contemplated their lives, and how they had nothing to live for, no hope in a future life. All they had to live for was this world, and I realized how dangerously close I was to losing my faith. I cried out in despair, God save me! I don't want to lose my faith. I have been doubting, I have questioned where you are. I don't have answers, but I don't care any more. Just help me not to lose my faith!

God worked a miracle. That very night, and the next day, God sent unexpected answers to that prayer. I

didn't have answers to my original prayer of why, but I had answers that God was there, that He did hear my prayers, and loved me. I received abundant evidence that God heard and answered my specific prayer. I praise God. God did not stop with answering that prayer that night and the next day. He knew I needed more long term help to get me back on my feet again, and so He continued answering that prayer for weeks until I was recovered.

It was some time after, that answers came as to why God had allowed certain things to happen. But God had been answering my prayer of some months earlier, when I had been praying that He increase my faith. God wanted me to realize, that we need to trust Him, when we don't have the answers why. When we can't see through the tunnel. That is the very time we need to trust Him.

Jesus asks, concerning the time when He returns, "shall He find faith on the earth?" This is not talking about a set of beliefs, or of religious services. This is talking about a confidence in His love, mercy and involvement in our personal lives. When He comes, will He find faith on the earth in you?

Scripture tells us of the Faith Giants "...Who through faith subdued kingdoms, wrought righteousness, obtained promises, stopped the mouths of lions," (Heb 11:33) Not only is faith necessary for great accomplishments, but it is necessary for the everyday life, for "the just shall live by faith..." Rom 1:17 In fact, "without faith [it is] impossible to please him" Heb 11:6



So what is faith?

Heb 11:1 Faith is a sure confidence of things which are hoped for, and a certainty of things which are not seen. (W. Tyndale)

This tells us it is confidence of something even if we can't see it. Knowing something is fact even if we don't have the evidence of our senses. The follow verse fills in another aspect to the meaning of faith.

Heb 11:6 But without faith [it is] impossible to please [him]: for he that cometh to God must believe that he is, and [that] he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek him.

This shows us not only do we need to know there is a God, and believe in His power. It shows the additional element of believing that He is a rewarder; that He will do what we ask of Him; that He loves us that much that He will answer our needs and our prayers. I might know God has the power to do something, but that is not sufficient. Faith goes beyond that. It is the belief that He will do it.

## Syrophentician Woman

An excellent illustration of faith, is

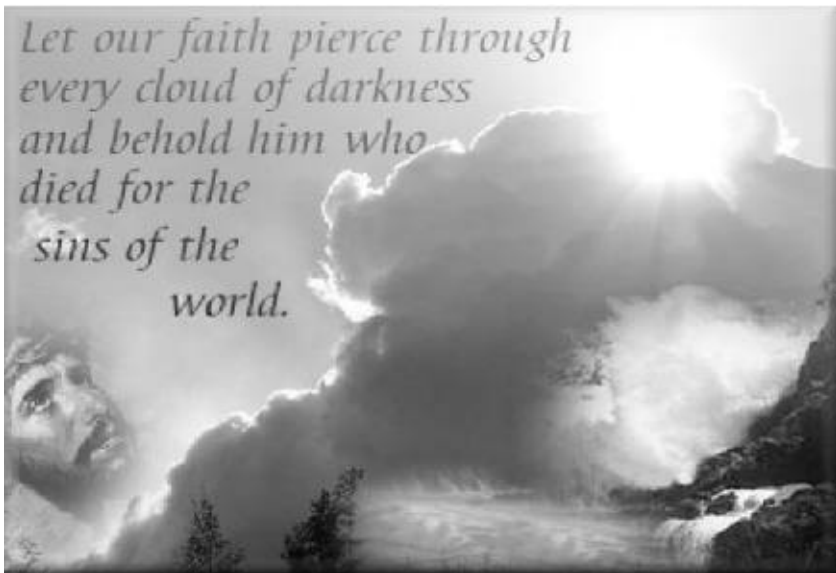
the syrophenician woman. She was re-buffed time after time. It was even insinuated that she was a dog. A great trial of her faith, but that trial just revealed her faith to the world. She would not be turned away. She trusted in the love and mercy of Christ, that He would not turn her away, but would help her. Jesus, made special note of her faith:

Then Jesus answered and said unto her, O woman, great is thy faith: be it unto thee even as thou wilt. And her daughter was made whole from that very hour. Mt 15:28

If this woman merely believed that Jesus could heal her daughter she would have gone away discouraged, without the precious blessing she desired. She had something more than that. She knew that without Jesus' help her daughter was hopeless, and she clung to Jesus as her only hope, trusting His mercy and love.

It is this trust in the love and mercy of God that must be combined with the knowledge of the power of God. This is true faith. It is also what the Bible means when it uses the term believe. The Gospel of John never mentions the word faith, but it uses the verb form of the word, believe, 46 times. So whether we are using the noun form faith, or the verb form - believe, it means the same thing.

Let our faith pierce through every cloud of darkness and behold him who died for the sins of the world.



### Blind Man

Another example of faith I want to point out is a blind man that Jesus healed. Jesus was walking by the way and saw this blind man. He spat on the ground and made clay, and anointed the man's eyes with it. Then He commanded him to go wash in the pool of Siloam. There surely must have been closer places to wash, but the man went to the specific place Jesus had sent him. The man's faith caused him to follow the instruction of Jesus implicitly. If he had not had sufficient faith in Christ to obey Him exactly, he would have lost his chance of healing. *His faith caused him to obey.*

### Summary

Biblical faith is:

- 1 Knowledge of God's power to act, and
- 2 Trust in His mercy and love, thus knowing that He will do what is asked of Him, and
3. Perfect trust in His wisdom that leads us to *obey Him implicitly.*

The next time you are beset by trials and wonder why, remember that is the very time to exercise faith. God has not promised to always answer our questions of *why*. The next time you read "the just shall live by faith..." or you hear a preacher talk about faith saying "...Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved...", remember what it means. ✍

## Prophecy Nugget

Prophecy can be very intriguing. But far too often it remains much of a mystery. This should not be for God's children. God wants us to understand else He would not have given it. He tells us: "...none of the wicked shall understand; but the wise shall understand."
